4. *Oxalis grandis* Small

Big Yellow Wood-sorrel

Petals yellow, more than 1 cm long; leaflets of principal leaves more than 25 mm wide, margins purple-brown; pedicels ascending.

5. *Oxalis violacea* L. forma *violacea*

Violet Oxalis, Violet Wood-sorrel

Aerial stems lacking; leaves basal, arising from bulb-like base; umbels few-flowered; petals violet-purple, base cream colored; sepals callous-tipped.

GERANIACEAE, Geranium Family

Herbs; leaves opposite or alternate; flowers hypogynous, bisporangiate, in cymose or umbellate clusters or rarely solitary; perianth regular or slightly zygomorphic; sepals 5, separate; petals 5, separate, alternating with glands; stamens 10 or 5; carpels 5, united, in fruit with long erect slender beak; locules 5; stigmas 5; ovules 1 or 2 per carpel; fruit a 5-seeded capsule.

- a Stamens with anthers 10 (5, in 1 species with palmately divided leaves). **1. GERANIUM**
- a' Stamens with anthers 5; leaves pinnately compound. **2. ERODIUM**

1. GERANIUM L. Crane's-bill, Wild Geranium

Leaves palmately lobed or divided or rarely compound; carpels dehiscent by coiling outward from base upward, remaining attached at tip.

Geranium sanguineum L. (Blood-red Crane's-bill, Eurasian; not mapped for Franklin Co. by Cooperrider 1995:16, illus. p. 17), with erect or decumbent stems, several to many cauline leaves, and crimson-purple petals, is a garden ornamental (15 May 1986—private garden, E. Northwood Ave., Cols., *Blanco*).

- a Leaves compound, the 3-5 leaflets pinnately divided; petals rose-purple; carpel-bodies, at maturity, separating from styles. **2. *G. robertianum***
- a' Leaves palmately deeply divided; carpel-bodies not separating.
 - b Only 1 pair of cauline leaves usually present; flowers 2-3 cm wide; petals pink-purple. **1. *G. maculatum***
 - b' More than 2 cauline leaves present; flowers usually smaller.
 - c Sepals awn-tipped. **3. *G. carolinianum***
 - c' Sepals not awn-tipped.
 - d Stamens 10; carpel-bodies glabrous, wrinkled. **4. *G. molle***
 - d' Stamens 5; carpel-bodies pubescent. **5. *G. pusillum***

1. *Geranium maculatum* L.

Wild Crane's-bill, Wild Geranium, Spotted Geranium

Flowers pink-purple, 2-3 cm wide; leaves deeply palmately divided, in addition to basal leaves 1 pair of well-developed cauline leaves present.

2. *Geranium robertianum* L.

Herb-Robert

Leaves palmately compound; leaflets 3-5, pinnately divided; petals rose-purple.

3. *Geranium carolinianum* L.

Carolina Crane's-bill

Leaves deeply palmately divided; sepals awn-tipped; petals pale bluish white-pink; carpel-bodies pubescent, hairs 1-2 mm long, glandless; pedicels 1-2 times the length of calyx; seeds faintly reticulate.

4. **Geranium molle* L.

Dove's-foot Crane's-bill

Adventive (native of Europe and W Asia)

Sepals not awned, acute to obtuse; petals pink-purple; carpel bodies glabrous; stamens 10.

5. **Geranium pusillum* L.

Small-flowered Crane's-bill

Naturalized (native of Europe)

Stamens 5; carpel-bodies pubescent.

NOTE: Not mapped for Franklin Co. by Cooperrider 1995:18 (illus. p. 19).

2. ERODIUM L. Storks-bill

Leaves pinnately compound, leaflets cleft or pinnatifid; sepals awned; petals rose-color, one a little smaller; stamens with anthers 5, filaments without anthers 5; carpel-bodies sharp-pointed at base, at dehiscence separating, the styles becoming spirally twisted.

1. **Erodium cicutarium* (L.) L'Hér.

Storks-bill, Alfilaria, Red-stemmed Filaree

Naturalized (native of the Mediterranean region)

Leaves pinnately compound, leaflets pinnately cleft; anther bearing stamens 5, flowers purple pink.

LIMNANTHACEAE, Meadow-foam Family

1. FLOERKEA Willd. False Mermaid

Diffuse delicate glabrous herb; leaves pinnately divided into narrow lobes; flowers small, hypogynous, bisporangiate, solitary in axils, stalked; sepals 3, separate; corolla regular; petals 3, separate, white, about 2 mm long, shorter than sepals; stamens 6; carpels 3 or 2, ovaries separate or nearly so, styles arising from base of ovaries, united at base but separate at top; carpels separating, each 1-seeded, indehiscent.

1. *Floerkea proserpinacoides* Willd.

False Mermaid

Delicate glabrous herb; leaves pinnately divided into lobes; sepals 3; petals 3, white, shorter than sepals; fruit tuberculate. Moist woodlands.

BALSAMINACEAE, Touch-me-not Family

1. IMPATIENS L. Jewel-weed, Touch-me-not

Succulent herbs; leaves alternate or whorled, simple; flowers hypogynous, bisporangiate, zygomorphic; sepals 3, the lower one saccate, spurred at base; petals 5, the lateral ones united in pairs, each pair appearing as one lobed petal; stamens 5; carpels 5, united, style 1; ovary 5-loculed; capsule elastically dehiscent.

- a Flowers yellow or orange, solitary or in clusters of a few in axils of crenate-serrate long-petioled leaves.
- b Flowers orange-yellow with red-brown mottlings; spur about 8 mm long, lying parallel with the sac; sac longer than wide. 1. *I. capensis*
- b' Flowers pale yellow, sometimes sparingly dotted; spur about 5 mm long, lying at right angle to sac; sac almost as wide as long. 2. *I. pallida*
- a' Flowers purple, rose, or white, solitary or few in axils of sharply toothed short-petioled leaves. 3. *I. balsamina*

1. *Impatiens capensis* Meerb.

Orange Touch-me-not, Jewel-weed

Flowers orange-yellow with red-brown mottlings; spur about 8 mm long, lying parallel with sac. Syn.: *I. biflora* Willd., *I. fulva* Nutt.

2. *Impatiens pallida* Nutt.

Pale or Yellow Touch-me-not, Jewel-weed

Flowers pale yellow; spur about 5 mm long, lying at right angle to sac.
