### 1. \*Linum usitatissimum L.

Common Flax

Adventive (European cultigen)

Annual; leaves alternate and 3-nerved; inner sepals ciliate; petals blue or white; stigmas linear.

#### 2. †Linum sulcatum Riddell

Grooved Yellow Flax

Sepals glandular-ciliate; petals yellow; leaf bases with two dark stipular glands along stem. REFERENCES: Selby & Craig 1890:8; Cooperrider 1995:5 (illus. p. 6).

3. Linum virginianum L.

Slender Yellow Flax

Inflorescence loosely corymbiform, more or less dichotomously branched, branches spreading; outer sepals not glandular; petals yellow; no glands at base of leaf; most leaf blades subulate-tipped. Syn.: L. virginianum var. texanum Planch.

## POLYGALACEAE, Milkwort Family

### 1. POLYGALA L. Milkwort

Herbs; leaves simple; flowers hypogynous, zygomorphic, bisporangiate, in spikes, racemes, or heads; sepals 5, the 3 of the outer circle (the uppermost and the 2 lower) small, the two inner or lateral ones (wings) larger and petaloid; petals 3, united, the lower one concave and often bearing a fringed crest; stamens 6 or 8, filaments united below in a sheath split on upper side and more or less united with petals; anthers 1-loculed, opening by a pore at or near the tip; carpels 2, united; style 1; ovary 2-loculed; capsule 2-seeded.

- a Leaves, at least the lower, whorled or opposite. 2. P. verticillata var. verticillata
- a' Leaves all alternate.
  - b Racemes spherical or short-cylindric, dense and headlike, 1-2 cm long, often 1 cm thick or more; stems solitary; annual. 3. P. sanguinea
  - b' Racemes dense, slender-cylindric; stems tufted, perennial; aril somewhat shorter than seed. 1. P. senega

1. Polygala senega L.

Seneca Snakeroot

Perennial herbs with woody rhizomes; leaves alternate, acuminate, lowest scalelike; racemes slender-cylindric, dense; flowers white-green; pedicels 1 mm long or less; cleistogamous flowers absent.

### 2. †Polygala verticillata L. var. verticillata

Whorled Milkwort

Herbs; leaves mostly whorled; racemes slender, cylindric-conic; flowers greenish-white to pink-tinged, tightly packed throughout inflorescence; wings obovate, rounded at tip, less than 3 mm long, shorter than capsule. REFERENCES: Riddell 1834:119 (*Polygala ambigua*); Cooperrider 1995:31 (illus. p. 28).

### 3. Polygala sanguinea L.

Purple Milkwort, Field Milkwort

Herbs; leaves alternate; flowers in spherical cylindric racemes; two inner lateral sepals (wings) petaloid, ovate or oval, rounded above; flowers rose-purple, green, or white; lobes of aril linear, 3/4 length of seed.

### STAPHYLEACEAE, Bladdernut Family

### 1. STAPHYLEA L. Bladdernut

Shrub or small tree; bark of twigs striped; leaves opposite, 3-foliolate, leaflets finely serrate; stipules early deciduous; flowers hypogynous, bisporangiate, in drooping terminal clusters; perianth regular; sepals 5; petals 5, greenish-white, separate, about 1 cm long; stamens 5, inserted outside the hypogynous disk; carpels 3, united; ovary 3-lobed, 3-loculed; placentae axile; ovules several in each locule; styles 3, separate below, coherent above; fruit a bladdery capsule.

### 1. Staphylea trifolia L.

Bladdernut

Shrub or small tree; leaves opposite, 3-foliolate, leaflets finely serrate; flowers in drooping clusters; sepals 5; petals 5, greenish-white; fruit a bladdery capsule.

# SAPINDACEAE, Soapberry Family

Trees or vines; leaves alternate, ternately or pinnately compound; inflorescence cymose-paniculate; flowers hypogynous, small, regular-irregular, perfect or more often functionally unisexual; sepals and petals 4 or 5; stamens 4-10, often 8, upon the annular or unilateral nectary-disk; capsule 3-lobed, 3-locular; fruits bladdery inflated.

- a Herbaceous vines, climbing by axillary tendrils; leaves ternate-biternate; flowers white, in small clusters on long peduncle. 1. CARDIOSPERMUM
- a' Trees, leaves pinnate-bipinnate; flowers bright yellow in broad loose panicles. 2. KOELREUTERIA
